

CIEE Open Campus: Berlin, Germany (Fall 2022)

Select courses as follows (18 credits in total):

1. Required German language course (3 credits)
2. Required five courses for a total of 15 credits
 - a. Block I: two courses, three credits each
 - b. Block II: two courses, three credits each
 - c. Block III: two courses, three credits each

- **IU students are required to take all six classes (18 credits). One class per Block must be taught in-person from the CIEE Berlin Center (internship or service learning included), highlighted below.**
- Students should inquire with ksabroad@indiana.edu about business credit. For Kelley majors, please contact the Kelley International Programs Office directly for business-specific equivalencies.
- Undistributed 100-level (-OS 100) courses have not yet been evaluated by an IUB department. Courses with a DEPT-OS 100 equivalent will be applied towards overall credits to graduate. However, students may submit the course materials to that department to be evaluated for specific credit either before or after studying abroad.
- If a course is listed as OS200/300/400, the course has been evaluated by the academic department. Be in touch with the academic department to determine how course may fulfill degree requirements.
- Some courses may carry pre-requisites; be sure to check the program's site to determine eligibility.
